#### THE GREEK ALPHABET - Part 2

In the first lesson we associated the first five letters of the KOINE Greek alphabet with the first five letters of the English alphabet. For Lesson 2 we will learn the next three (3) letters of the alphabet. We are calling these the "rhyme" letters because the names of the letters have a rhyme to them.

The names of the letters are as follows:

You should learn the order of these letters according to the rhyme of their names. The exercises for Lesson 2 will help you learn to write and pronounce them.


#### **EXERCISE ONE**

#### **WRITING & PRONUNCIATION EXERCISES**

After you learn the order of the three Greek letters in Lesson 2, you should learn the writing and pronunciation of them by using the exercises below.

Write each letter in printed form and at the same time verbally pronounce its name and sound. For example, the first letter will be ZETA ( $\zeta$ ). Write the letter in printed form and while writing the letter say, "ZETA, dZ." You should say the name "ZETA" when you begin to write the letter and the pronunciation "dZ" during your final loop at the bottom.

After you have practiced each of the three letters across a complete line, you should combine the letters and practice them in order, pronouncing each letter and letter sound as you write. Your practice paper should look like this:



After you practice the three letters of Lesson 2 in combination, you should practice all eight letters of Lessons 1 and 2 in combination, pronouncing each letter name and letter sound as you write. Your practice paper should look like this:



You should practice the above exercises until you are familiar with the name, order, and pronunciation of the first eight Greek letters of the Greek alphabet.
